Kansas City Arts Incubator Hosts Czecholovakian Photo Exhibit: "August 68"

wine and cheese reception was held on March 4 at the Arts Incubator in Kansas City to introduce "August '68," a photojournalistic exhibit of the Warsaw Pact Armies invasion of Czechoslovakia. The exhibit was organized and



secured by Ross Marine, Honorary Consul of the Slovak Republic for the states of Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska and Missouri. Approximately 150 people attended the reception including special guests Miroslav Wlachovsy, Political Counselor, Embassy of the Slovak Republic and Jay Niemczyk, former Ambassador to Czechoslovakia from the United States and chairman emeritus of Kansas City-based People to People.

The Honorable Kay Barnes, Mayor of Kansas City, and Jackson County Executive Kathryn Shields issued proclamations in recognition of the photo exhibit and the 35th anniversary of the invasion of Czechoslovakia by the "Warsaw Pact Armies." Mayor Barnes declared Friday, March 5th as "Slovak Republic Day" in Kansas City and Jackson County, Missouri. Additional resolutions were presented by Midwest area political leaders.

The Arts Incubator, located at 115 W. 18th Street, is one of several galleries in the area comprising Kansas City's arts district. "First Fridays" have become a popular event for art lovers, visiting galleries in the arts district the first Friday of each month. Nearly 1,500 people attended the "August 68" exhibit on March 5th, also the first Friday of the exhibit.

The exhibit began its US tour on Oct 2003, traveling to Pittsburgh, PA, Cleveland, OH, and Cedar Rapids, IA. After its stop in Kansas City (through March 31), the exhibit's next stop is Denver, CO (May 2004).

The Czech-Slovak Club of Greater Kansas City was a significant financial contributor, helping secure the exhibit's stop in Kansas City. The club expresses their thanks to Ross Marine for hosting a successful reception. It was a hit!!!

Republics Join EU

The Czech and Slovak Republics, along with Estonia, Cyprus, Lithuania, Latvia, Hungary, Malta, Poland and Slovenia, will join the EU May 1, 2004.

The Czech Republic

Over the past decade, the Czech society has undergone dramatic changes. After the political changeover in November 1989, the Czech Republic quickly became a pluralist democracy, the centrally planned economy was turned into a functioning free-market economy. Almost 75 years after its founding, former Czechoslovakia split up peacefully in 1992 and gave birth to an independent Czech Republic.

After 1989, the EU has become Czech Republic's largest trading partner with more than 65% share of its foreign trade. EU member states are now the largest investors in the country. Czechs have always shared the European civilization and cultural values, and are part of European history. Accession to the EC (later EU) has been perceived by a majority of the Czech population as a historic necessity and full integration into the EU is supported by all parliamentary parties in the Czech Republic.

The Slovak Republic

In addition to joining the EU, the Slovak Republic will become a NATO member on May 1. Memberships in both NATO and the EU signify the priority Slovak foreign policy-makers have placed on being a substantial part of the European and world democracy.

Kuchyne (Kitchen)

"Easter Lamb" Sponge Cake (Velikoncni Beranek)

Ingredients

2 eggs

5 egg yolks

1 cup sugar

Juice from 1/2 lemon

Rind from 1/2 lemon

1/2 teaspoon vanilla

1-2 insides of a peach stone (bitter almonds)

5 egg whites

2 3/4 cups flour

Butter or cooking spray for pan

Icing

1 egg white

6 tablespoons sugar 1 tablespoon lemon juice

Mix together 1 cup sugar, 5 egg yolks, 2 whole eggs, juice and rind from 1/2 lemon, and vanilla. Mix about 1/2 hour.

Grate in 1 or 2 bitter almonds (optional). Beat egg whites until stiff and mix into egg mixture alternately with sifted flour. Grease well, both halves of a lamb mold (or spray with cooking spray). Pour dough into the "face" half of the mold until it is 7/8 full. Place on a cookie sheet and cover with the other half of the mold.

Bake in a preheated 350 degree oven for 40-50 minutes. Check at 40 minutes by lifting up the back of the lamb mold. The dough should be lightly brown and spring back when touched. Let mold cool 10 minutes. Place plate over mold and invert. Let lamb cool on its back for 5 minutes. Then set it up on the plate. Add the final touches when it is completely cooled.

Icing: Cream together 1 egg white, 6 heaping tablespoons powdered sugar and 1 tablespoon lemon juice. Mix until thick and smooth. To decorate: Sprinkle with powdered sugar or frost with icing. Add raisins for eyes and nose and tie on a pretty ribbon.

Lincoln Czechs and Slovaks in Nebraska celebrated their heritage at Czech Days Feb. 12-25 at the University of Nebraska – Lincoln (UNL). Czech Ambassador to the United States, Martin Palous, opened the event at the UNL Student Union. He spoke about the Czech and Slovak Republics pending inau-

guation into the EU. Palous said, "It is the return to Europe, and we wanted to do anything possible to come back from where we were" (referring to the Communist regime of the former Czechoslovakia that was overturned in 1989). "The Europe we are returning to is different than it used to be. We want to be there despite that."

Czech Days included a Czech Language
Foundation (CLF)
Banquet on Feb. 13 at the Cornhusker Hotel in Lincoln. The fundraiser supported CLF, a nonprofit organization for UNL students who take Czech language classes. CLF promotes the study of Czech language and

culture. It was founded in 1993 in response to the University's plans to discontinue Czech classes, which date to 1907.

Over 125 people attended the banquet including Lincoln's mayor, Colleen Seng. Ambassador Palous delivered the keynote address, focusing on Czech Ethnic Organizations in North America. Palous also remarked, "Nebraska is one of the last states for me to visit - perhaps it should have been one of the first."

Palous was accompanied to Omaha on Feb. 14 by Layne Pierce and Mila Saskova-Pierce. They met with local educational leaders at the University of Nebraska - Omaha and a group from the Czech and Slovak community at the Bohemian Café. Layne is the president of the CLF. Mila is a professor of Czech language at UNL. Mila and Layne previously lived in Lawrence, KS where Mila was a professor at KU. They were also instrumental in starting the Czech and Slovak Club of Greater Kansas City.
